## **Movement and Shipping Requirements for SWINE**

To comply with New Mexico Livestock Board Statutes and Rules and USDA interstate movement requirements, the following requirements apply to swine:

- 1) Interstate Movement of SWINE INTO NEW MEXICO FROM ANOTHER STATE will require:
  - Certificate of Veterinary Inspection dated within 30 days prior to entry into the State of New Mexico, unless exempted. (NMAC 21.32.4.14) The CVI should contain a statement that the "swine have not been fed raw garbage". (21.32.4.14) and "The pigs in this shipment did not originate from a premises where porcine epidemic diarrhea virus (PEDv) has been diagnosed in the past 60 days, and are free of signs associated with PEDv infection."

## Effective May 2023

Any livestock (equine, bovine, porcine, caprine, ovine, or cervidae) interstate movements **into** New Mexico from a county where vesicular stomatitis has been diagnosed in the last fourteen (14) days, or from a county that has livestock quarantined for vesicular stomatitis, shall be accompanied by an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI), dated within the fourteen (14) days before entry, with the following veterinary verification statement:

"All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection were inspected and found to be free from clinical signs of vesicular stomatitis."

- An entry permit issued by the NMLB office (NMAC 21.32.4.14). Please contact the NMLB permit line for an entry permit (800) 432-6889.
- > Official individual identification universal ear notch system or ear tag.
- If entering New Mexico FOR EXHIBITION PURPOSES, swine MUST be identified by the universal ear notch system regardless of the presence of official ear tag or any other type of official ID recognized for swine (NMAC 21.32.5.8), AND be accompanied by a legal bill of sale. (NMAC 21.32.5.9)
- Swine consigned directly to slaughter or to an approved quarantined feedlot are exempt from ID requirements. (21.32.4.14)
- > All swine, regardless of age, must meet one of the **Brucellosis** qualifiers below:
  - Originate form a herd that "resides in a Swine Brucellosis Free state" and indicated on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection <u>or</u>
  - originate from a "Validated Swine Brucellosis Free Herd" and have the date of the last herd test and the herd certificate number indicated on the approved Certificate of Veterinary Inspection <u>or</u>

- "prove negative to a Brucellosis test" conducted within 30 days and indicated on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. (NMAC 21.32.4.14)
- > All swine, regardless of age, must meet one of the **<u>Pseudorabies</u>** qualifiers below:
  - Originate from a herd that "resides in a Pseudorabies Stage V-Free state" and indicated on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or
  - originate from a "Qualified Pseudorabies Free Herd" and have the date of the last herd test and the herd certificate number indicated on the approved Certificate of Veterinary Inspection <u>or</u>
  - "prove negative to an official Pseudorabies test" conducted within 30 days and indicated on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. (NMAC 21.32.4.14)
- An import inspection and Form-1 issued by an NMLB inspector after arrival and before commingling with any other swine on the destination premises.
- PLEASE NOTE: Additional requirements for such movement of SWINE may exist due to special circumstances such as a disease outbreak. Check with NM State Veterinarian's Office for the most current entry requirements before movement.
- 2) Interstate Movement of SWINE FROM THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO TO ANOTHER STATE will require at a minimum:
  - **Export inspection and Form-1** issued by an NMLB inspector.
  - Must meet all entry requirements of the receiving state. PLEASE NOTE: The NM owner or their veterinarian should check with the State Veterinarian's Office in the state of destination for that state's most current entry requirements for swine before movement.
- 3) Intrastate Movement of SWINE WITHIN THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO and <u>crossing inspection</u> <u>district boundaries</u> requires an in state move Form 1 inspection by an NMLB livestock inspector or brand inspector. Additional requirements for such movement of swine within the state may exist due to special circumstances such as a disease outbreak. Check with your local inspector or the NM State Veterinarian's Office before movement. (NMAC 21.32.3.9)
- 4) Intrastate Movement of SWINE WITHIN AN NMLB INSPECTION DISTRICT may be done with proof of ownership, typically a bill of sale. (NMAC 21.32.3.8)
